Entry-Level Driver Training

Entry-Level Driver Training (ELDT)

- MAP-21 requirement established through negotiated rulemaking.
 - Codified at 49 CFR part 380, subpart G.
- The Entry-Level Driver Training (ELDT) regulations improve safety by establishing a Federal minimum standard of training individuals must complete before testing for certain commercial driver's licenses (CDLs) and endorsements.
 - Sets a national baseline for entry-level driver training.
- States may have requirements that exceed the Federal requirements.
- To ensure driver-trainees are thoroughly trained in safe driving practices, providers must meet all established requirements.
- Gives States information they need at critical safety checkpoints.

Entry-Level Drivers – Who Is Covered?

The ELDT regulations establish new minimum training standards for entry-level drivers. This includes individuals applying for:

A Class A or Class B commercial driver's license (CDL) for the first time

An upgrade of an existing Class B CDL to a Class A CDL

A hazardous materials (H), passenger (P), or school bus (S) endorsement for the first time

The rule does not cover individuals for whom States have waived the CDL skills test under 49 CFR part 383.

Training Requirements

 Entry-level drivers must receive training and demonstrate proficiency in the following areas:



- Lectures, demonstrations, computer-based, online learning, etc.
- May use a simulator
- No minimum number of hours; must score at least 80% on assessment
- Training topics include:
 - Basic Operation
 - Safe Operating Procedures
 - Advanced Operation Procedures
 - Vehicle Systems and Reporting Malfunctions
 - Non-Driving Activities (e.g., Hours of Service)



BEHIND-THE-WHEEL (BTW) TRAINING

- Actual operation of a CMV
- Takes place on a range or public road
- May not use a simulator to meet requirements
- No minimum number of hours, training provider will determine driver's proficiency
- Basic vehicle control skills and mastery of basic maneuvers


Training Provider Requirements

- What is a training provider?
 - An entity that is listed on the FMCSA Training Provider Registry
 - This includes:
 - Training schools
 - Educational institutions
 - Rural electronic cooperatives
 - Motor carriers
 - State/local governments
 - School districts
 - Joint labor management
 - Owner-operators
 - Individuals

Training Provider Requirements

As of February 7, 2022:

 Training providers wishing to provide entry-level driver training must register and self-certify that they meet all FMCSA and State requirements that apply to:




For full training provider requirements, see 49 CFR part 380, Subpart G

The Training Provider Registry


Training Provider Registry

FMCSA Web System that:

- Contains the official list of approved entry-level driver training providers.
- Retains a record of drivers that have successfully completed entry-level driver training.
- Allows drivers to search for approved training providers





State Guidance for Submitting State Noncompliance

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FMCSA encourages States to send notice to a Provider(s) they feel are not meeting State requirement(s)

- Send Provider a letter citing requirement(s) with a request to comply within a given time
- If the Provider meets the requested requirement(s), no further action is required
- If the Provider does not meet the requested requirement(s), see options below

If a State wants FMCSA to investigate a Provider for State noncompliance

- The State must provide FMCSA with a copy of a letter sent to the Provider citing State requirement(s) with a request to comply within a given time
- FMCSA will use the State's letter as the basis for an investigation and send the Provider a Notice of Investigation
- FMCSA's Notice of Investigation will reiterate the State's request and hold the Provider to the State's date for compliance
 - If the Provider meets the requested requirement(s), no further action is required.
 - If the Provider does not meet the requested requirement(s), the Provider is issued a Notice of Proposed Removal and listed on the TPR

State Guidance for Submitting State Noncompliance

If a State wants FMCSA to immediately remove a Provider from the TPR (Emergency Removal)

- Provide FMCSA with a copy of the State requirement(s)
- Provide FMCSA with a copy of the letter sent to the Provider citing State requirement(s) with a request to comply within a given time
- Proof of letter delivery
- Evidence that the reasonable time for requested compliance has passed

Allegations of Noncompliance Investigations

Training Provider Investigations

Investigations will focus on the components alleged in a complaint or determined in an audit/review, unless, during the investigation other areas of potential noncompliance are discovered.

EMERGENCY REMOVAL

Emergency Removal from the TPR is initiated in cases of fraud, criminal behavior, willful disregard of the ELDT rule or in which the public health, interest, or safety requires immediate removal.
